Panther Battalion: The Fortress of Evil By Arne Lindmo | Illustrated by Ida Skjelbakken

A fully illustrated, full-color historical adventure novel for middle-grade readers (approx. 9–13 years).

November 1942. Norway is under Nazi occupation.

Twelve-year-old Petter and his best friend Sara spend their school recess playing war games—imagining themselves heroes fighting Hitler. But when a new girl joins their class, their childish play collides with brutal reality.

Hanna is the daughter of the German commandant stationed at the local fortress. She arrives from Berlin carrying the propaganda she has been taught: Jews are the enemy. Sara, however, is Jewish.

What begins as classroom tension quickly escalates into tragedy. Sara's parents are arrested. Her grandmother is shot. Petter's attempt to intervene leads him into direct conflict with German soldiers—and ultimately into the heart of the fortress itself. With Hanna's unexpected help, Petter launches a reckless rescue mission. What they discover inside the fortress is far more terrifying than they imagined: Nazi leaders are preparing to deploy a massive experimental "super bomb" by submarine—a weapon powerful enough to destroy all of London.

Suddenly, the children are no longer just trying to save one friend. They may be the only ones who can prevent catastrophe. In a daring sequence that blends historical detail with high-stakes adventure, the trio:

- Escape imprisonment through a ventilation shaft,
- Seize control of a German Panther tank,
- Help local resistance fighters capture the fortress,
- And ultimately confront a submarine carrying the devastating bomb.

At the heart of the story lies a powerful moral dilemma:

- Is it right to risk the lives of a few to save millions?
- Can friendship survive ideology?
- And can a child unlearn hatred taught by adults?

Hanna must choose between loyalty to her father and doing what is right. Petter must confront the consequences of his impulsiveness. Sara must find strength in the face of persecution.



The climax delivers thrilling action, but the emotional resolution is rooted in courage, forgiveness, and the belief that individuals—even children—can change history.

- “What if?” alternate-history tension grounded in real WWII events

Historical Context

The novel is inspired by real events during the Nazi occupation of Norway, including:

- The deportation of Norwegian Jews in 1942
- German submarine bases along the Norwegian coast
- Nazi research into nuclear weapons and heavy water

While the children’s tank capture and atomic plot are fictional, the historical framework is accurate and carefully researched. A factual afterword explains the real historical background.
